# Messages



## CHAIRMAN OF FEU DR. NICANOR REYES SCHOOL OF MEDICINE ALUMNI FOUNDATION (FEUDNRSMAF) Manuel A. Malicay, MD, FACP, FAHA, Class '72

The challenges and expectations were high for the current administration's management of the 43rd Annual Reunion and Scientific Convention held from June 27 to 30, 2024. The primary goals were to ensure the event's success and profitability, and I am pleased to report that we exceeded those expectations. The event began with the Hawaiian Welcome Dinner Program, designed to offer

arriving alumni and guests a chance to relax, dine, dance, and enjoy entertainment. The evening featured the captivating vocals of Dr. Manuel Sanchez and Mrs. Elizabeth Lardizabal-Malabana, a violin performance by Dr. Natalie Fogata, and a charming Hawaiian dance by Dr. Leilanie Mon, all of which achieved our goal of providing a memorable welcome. We were also honored by a brief address from Dr. Teodoro Herbosa, Secretary of Health of the Philippines, who attended with his wife and spoke about the current state of healthcare in the Philippines.

For the first time, the CME program was a full-day event and received remarkable reviews for its organization, quality, and the relevance of its clinical topics presented by distinguished speakers. A highlight of the program was the 8th Annual Ricardo L. Alfonso, MD Memorial Lecture, delivered by Dr. Teodoro Herbosa, who discussed the Philippine health care system and the implementation of Universal Health Care (UHC). According to Dr. Herbosa, the Philippine health sector is guided by the 8-Point Action Agenda under the theme "Sa Bagong Pilipinas, Bawat Bahay Mahalaga," reflecting a collective commitment to realizing UHC. The agenda includes eight primary care outcomes: immunization, nutrition, maternal health, water, sanitation and hygiene, tuberculosis and HIV, road safety, and noncommunicable diseases (such as hypertension, diabetes, and cancer). Dr. Herbosa emphasized that the Department of Health firmly believes that quality, affordable, comprehensive, coordinated, continuous, and cost-effective primary care serves as the cornerstone for achieving UHC. He encouraged everyone to actively participate

and take full advantage of this platform to create meaningful connections.

The Filipiniana Gala and the Grand Ball were extremely successful, held in the beautifully decorated International Ballroom of the Hyatt, which provided the perfect backdrop for a grand celebration. Each program began with a parade of the Officers of the Foundation, followed by the celebrating jubilarian classes, which was truly unique.

During the Filipiniana Gala, the 43rd new set of officers were inducted by Dean Rey De Los Reyes, standing in for Dr. Teodoro Herbosa, who had to return to the Philippines by order of President Ferdinand Marcos. The evening included the Medallion Ceremony, honoring the following celebrating classes: Class '79: Sapphire, Class '84: Ruby, Class '89: Coral, Class '94: Pearl, Classes 2004, 2009, and 2014. The newly inducted officers and the Chicago alumni group presented the elegant and regal *"Rigodon de Honor."* 

The Gala Ball was radiant and delightful, with a fully filled ballroom. The medallion ceremony honored the Jubilarian Classes: Class '64: Diamond, Class '69: Emerald, Class '74: Golden and Class '99: Silver. Following the medallion ceremony, the jubilarian classes showcased their presentations. The official program concluded with an award presentation and a raffle drawing, which raised \$9,580.00, earmarked for the Scholarship Fund.

The total number of attendees was 284 for the Gala Ball and 265 for the Filipiniana Gala. The 134 for the Welcome Night. The jubilarian attendees were as follows: Diamond-20, Emerald- 23, Golden-8, Sapphire-3, Ruby-35, Coral-20, Platinum-1, Pearl and Silver-0. Overall, the 43rd Annual Reunion and Convention netted \$43,256.87.

The Board of Trustees meeting was unusually long. The following recommendations of the Finance Committee were approved by the BOT:

- 1. To sell non-performing assets and reinvest them in performing assets.
- 2. Maintain a conservative profile of the portfolio but explore the possibilities of investing small amounts into cryptocurrency, artificial intelligence, and robotics.
- 3. Grant the Financial Committee fiduciary responsibility for investing this portfolio without much undue interference from others.
- 4. Gradually shift to a self-directed feature of this portfolio to save money.
- 5. Reduce the number of securities held to simplify and streamline the portfolio.
- 6. Create a wire transfer capability from Morgan Stanley to the FEU School of Medicine.
- 7. Apply for sales tax exemption in the State of Nevada.
- 8. Abolish the position of financial coordinator as it is no longer needed.

# PRESIDENT and CHIEF OPERATING OFFICER OF FEU DR. NICANOR REYES MEDICAL FOUNDATION **Juan Enrique J. Reyes, MHM**



To our beloved alumni,

We thank you for inquiring regarding the present status of FEU-NRMF Medical Center. While I would have preferred to share more comprehensive updates with you in the 2025 State of the Foundation Address, it would be a disservice if your request had fallen on

deaf ears, especially knowing the type of love and support you have for your Alma Mater.

To recapitulate, our Management Agreement with AC Health took effect last February 1, 2024. Under the agreement, we have given them authority to establish organizational structures, craft or modify policies and procedures, assess contracts, and perform any and all other acts incidental and proper to the management. Ownership of the assets, accreditations, insurances, licenses, and permits have been retained for the time being and all employees are still employed by FEU-NRMF.

Notably, they deployed Mrs. Margaret A. Bengzon as the interim Chief Operating Officer, concurrently serving as the COO of AC Health, and formerly the President and CEO of Guam Regional Medical City as well as the head of the JP Morgan Chase Bank in the Philippines. Another welcome addition is Mr. Karl Nick D. Balintec, an up-and-coming executive hired to be the Chief Financial Officer of our hospital and whose duties shall carry over when the lease kicks in on January 1, 2025. Considering that capital infusion and other significant renovations are scheduled to begin next year, their ability to deliver results and The impact of the institution with our current resources has been astounding.

## July 2024 Year-to-date Highlights

Year-to-date (YTD) figures for July 2024 show that our numbers are mostly on the upswing, exceeding expectations and projections made prior to signing in October 2023:

I. In-patient

- A. 37% increase in revenue from ₱192M (July 2023) to 263M (July 2024)
- B. 29% increase in admissions from 2,363 (July 2023) to 3,054 (July 2024)
- C. 76% private-bed occupancy rate
- D. 40% service-bed occupancy rate

These can be largely attributed to the Human Resources Division for their retention and attraction strategies, allowing us to admit more patients (11 vs 14 – average daily admission) with additional healthcare workers on board. For our service beds, rooms would need to be refurbished before expecting a higher occupancy rate.

#### **II.** Outpatient

- A. 19% increase in revenue from ₱92M (July 2023) to 110M (July 2024)
- B. 45% increase in procedures from 78,297 (July 2023) to 113,716 (July 2024)

All these in spite of challenges with our equipment. Within the period covered, the MRI was down for five months, the CT-Scan for a month, and histopathology-related machines for three months. Fortunately, the centralization of our clinics in the Upper Ground level, prior to their entry, provided better accessibility as opposed to having multiple consultation areas in the facility and losing the opportunity to have their tests performed in-house.

#### **III.** Attrition

Although FEU-NRMF Medical Center possesses the largest headcount and bed capacity across the Healthway Medical Network, it has the lowest YTD Attrition Rate at 10.6% and lowest Annualized Attrition Rate at 16.0% as opposed to YTD Attrition averages between 14-26% and Annualized Attrition averages between 24-40%.

Hopefully, this trend continues past December 2024. Given that FEU-NRMF as a juridical entity shall cease to operate the hospital, the employment would be transferred to Healthway Hospital Fairview, Inc. Legally, we are bound to provide all affected personnel with the pay and compensation they are due at the time of separation.

#### Ayala's "Care Beyond Cure"

This is the tagline of Healthway Medical Network. A credo or model of care which they wish to embody when interacting with their patients, colleagues, and other valued stakeholders. Let us be their testament. When they say, "*Care Beyond Cure*", it is not limited to the healthcare setting or to the course of their treatment. FEU-NRMF has been a beneficiary of how much they care for their partners no matter how small or big the business may be. Since we've signed with them, we can enumerate a handful of items where they were of great help to our institution.

#### I. Quezon City relations

There is a proverb that says, "You don't know what you have until it's gone." For those who may not know, we are relatives of the two Aquino presidents through our Cojuangco lineage. The late JCR was very strict about not calling in favors, especially if this may compromise, besmirch, or put into question the image and reputation of our relatives who had to act in the best interest of the Filipino people. Interestingly, this is what impressed us about the Zobel de Ayalas. After all, you don't become the quintessential Filipino family business if you fail to maintain healthy relations with both the public and private sector. All these years, we seemingly had smooth relations with our local government unit. Unfortunately, the tide had turned, and our obvious political affiliations were no longer in the good graces of the court of public opinion. This led to having more

bumps and bruises that we needed to navigate no matter how legal or constitutional we believed our actions were. Hence, our new partners showed us the ropes, stressed the importance of collaboration, and helped renew our ties across all levels – from the barangay, to the city hall, the legislative branch, up to the executive level through Private Sector Advisory Council – Health Sector Lead Mr.Paolo Borromeo, who is also the President and CEO of AC Health.

## II. IERC

Among AC Health's aspirations is to mirror the best practices of cancer hospitals around the globe where they have a research arm geared toward curing the most complicated diseases. With their research being in its nascent stages, they identified the strength of FEU-NRMF's Institutional Ethics Review Committee having the highest level of accreditation from the Philippine Health Research Ethics Board. This is an essential component before proceeding with any type of research leading to the signing our second memorandum with them.

#### **III. School of Pharmacy**

Our third memorandum covers rotations or internships in Healthway's wide array of clinics and hospitals. With more tycoons in the pharmaceutical space (e.g. Ques of Mercury Drug, Gokongweis through four chains under Robinsons Retail Holdings, and Sys through Watsons), AC Health needs to employ an enticing method to capture the interest of future pharmacists while allowing them to complete curricular requirements.

#### **IV. Supply Chain**

We cannot stress enough the power of having economies of scale. We have vendors who have been in business with us since 1955. Yet, AC Health managed to command better terms and prices simply because they had more than one hospital.

#### V. Typhoon Carina

FEU-NRMF was not spared from the onslaught of Typhoon Carina. Roads were not passable, our Lower Ground was flooded, the hospital lost power, and we could not access our generators. Again, one call from our friends and Meralco were onsite not too long after to help restore electricity.

#### VI. ACEN

With the growing demand for renewable energy, incentives for sustainability initiatives, and clamor for cheaper electricity, our Institute of Medicine shall ride on the renewable energy supply of the hospital to allow us to do our part in saving mother earth and to reallocate financial resources toward loan repayments, infrastructure improvements, and growth.

#### VII. Scholarships

As a gesture of their goodwill and philanthropy, AC Health and FEU-NRMF are working on scholarship opportunities for those in the baccalaureate level. This would also provide a steady supply of professionals as they expand their network to meet the demand in their estates.

#### In Thy Happy Halls, Thy Will Be Done

Reflecting on the progress we've made, indeed, the FEUture looks bright, and we have much to be excited for our Medical Center. Admittedly, there have been times, early on, where we've pondered about our decision to

lease the hospital and if allowing professionals to take over was the best course of action due to mere sentimentality. Then, as soon as that fleeted, thoughts on whether we had chosen the right partner would enter our minds. We've always believed that if you keep your intentions pure, serve as a vehicle or instrument for good deeds, and ambition for something bigger than yourself, the universe will find a way to make the stars align and put you in a favorable position to achieve your mission or cause.

Today, let me be the first to say that we are very pleased with Ayala, and we are certain that they can propel FEU-NRMF Medical Center to greater heights; even better than how our forefathers envisioned it to be. The Department of Health licenses are underway, committees are being formed and completed, and much-awaited increases in the compensation for clinical chairs, section heads, and residents have been presented with performance-based incentives to help the institution realize its full potential since transferring to Fairview in 1999. That said, we hope our alumni grace us with their presence in the next Foundation Week. It would be an honor to have you during the 2025 State of the Foundation Address. By then, we could share a more complete picture of the Institute of Medicine and Medical Center. Akin to the Carpenters' hit, *"We've only just begun."* The best is yet to come.

CONGRATULATIONS to the FEUDNRSMAF Organizing Committee, led by President Dr. Nida Blankas-Hernaez and Chairman of the Board Dr. Manuel Malicay,

for the successful 2024 Annual Reunion and Scientific Convention held on June 27-28, 2024, in Chicago, Illinois, USA. The scientific program was expertly crafted and highly relevant, while the social events were enjoyable, entertaining, and well-attended.

In other news, the School of Medicine was visited by the Philippine Accrediting Association of Schools, Colleges, and Universities (PAASCU) from April 24-26, 2024. PAASCU accreditation is crucial for our graduates to be eligible for the ECFMG examination, which is required for residency training in the United States. PAASCU is the only accrediting body in the Philippines recognized by the World Federation of Medical Education (WFME). The wait is over—we received our Certification of Accreditation on August

9, 2024, valid until 2029. We are now a Level III accredited medical school and will begin working towards Level IV accreditation.

The academic year 2024-2025 began on August 5, 2024, for Level I-III medical students. We welcomed 489 freshmen during their orientation on July 27, 2024, at the JCR Gym. The event was attended by President Juan Enrique J. Reyes, Dean Rey H. de los Reyes, Vice Dean Abigail DG Castro, and the Chairmen and Faculty of First Year subjects.

Students were introduced to the school's mission and vision, policies, rules, and regulations, as well as the student services available. They also learned about the various student organizations and non-curricular activities. The Medicine Student Council provided invaluable support to the Admission Committee and Administration in welcoming our new students.

In our pursuit of excellence, a curriculum review was conducted on July 23-24, 2024, led by the Curriculum Committee of the Medical Education Unit. Attended by the Dean, Vice Dean, Department Chairs, and Subject Coordinators, the review aimed to:

- 1. Streamline course content in both topics and areas.
- 2. Redesign the curriculum to fully utilize blended modes of onsite, online synchronous, and asynchronous instructional delivery.
- 3. Focus lectures and small group activities on common diseases in the Philippines.
- 4. Emphasize primary care and a first-contact approach in lectures and clinical case discussions.
- 5. Incorporate community-oriented lay education and patient education on disease awareness and prevention.

Thanks to the active participation of all involved, we successfully achieved our objectives, and these changes will be implemented this school year. We extend our gratitude to the UNILAB Group for their assistance in this endeavor.

Preparations for the Medicine Alumni Homecoming on January 16-18, 2025, are in full swing. The scientific activities on January 16-17, 2025, will be held at Alfonso Hall of the FEU-NRMF Complex, while the grand Alumni Night on January 18, 2025, will take place at the Makati Shangri-La Hotel. We warmly invite everyone to join us, reconnect with friends and classmates, and forge new connections. Our Alma Mater eagerly awaits your return to the FEU-NRMF Campus in Fairview, Quezon City.

## From a CME SPEAKER

#### Intraocular Lenses – Which is Best for Me?

Lens opacity is a natural part of aging eyes, often leading to

cataracts. An intraocular lens (IOL) is a synthetic replacement for the clouded lens, typically implanted during a phacoemulsification procedure. There are four major types of IOLs, each with unique benefits and considerations.

#### 1. Monofocal Lens

The monofocal lens is the most commonly implanted IOL worldwide. It has a single focal point, usually set for excellent distance vision. This lens is ideal for patients with retinal conditions such as diabetic retinopathy, age-related macular degeneration, or other retinal issues. Typically, the ophthalmologist will correct distance vision and prescribe glasses for fine-tuning both distance and near vision. Patients may opt for "monovision" surgery, where one eye is corrected for distance and the other for near vision. However, it's important to note that this can affect depth perception, known as stereopsis.

#### 2. Multifocal IOL

Multifocal lenses correct vision at multiple distances—far, intermediate, and near—offering the possibility of a spectacle-free life. However, they come with potential drawbacks, including complaints of glare and halos, especially during nighttime driving. While some patients may adapt to these issues over six months, it's not guaranteed. Multifocal IOLs are generally not recommended for patients with retinal disorders or those with overly high expectations for perfect vision.

#### 3. Extended Depth of Focus (EDOF) Lens

EDOF lenses provide good distance and intermediate vision, reducing the need for glasses while driving or using gadgets. They are particularly well-suited for patients who rely on computers for work. Personally, if I were to undergo cataract surgery, this would be my lens of choice.

#### 4. Toric IOL

Toric lenses are designed for patients with significant astigmatism (greater than -1.00 cylinder). These patients often require astigmatic correction in their glasses long before developing cataracts. Toric IOLs address this issue directly, providing clearer vision without the need for additional corrective lenses.

**In summary,** it's essential to have a detailed discussion—what I call "Chair time"—with your ophthalmologist to determine the ideal IOL for your needs. I hope this article helps you make an informed decision about the best type of IOL for you.

# **DIAMOND CLASS '64**

Fabulous Class '64 Diamond Jubilee Reunion: A Historical Perspective

In 1964, 241 of us proudly received our medical degrees, though only 188 were featured in the class yearbook for reasons unknown. As students, we admired our professors and envied those who trained in the US, so it was no surprise that after passing the Philippines Licensure Exam and ECFMG, many of us applied for J-1 visas to pursue further training in the United States. Though the journey seemed financially daunting, American Airlines' *"Fly Now Pay Later"* program allowed us to reach the US, even without a cent in our pockets.

Before leaving, we had to pass a rigorous physical exam and were given a crash course on American daily life, including their obsession with weather changes and some quirky slang like "*I have the runs*" and "*somebody is cutting the cheese.*" Our internships in the US were no picnic—on call every other night and weekend, we accepted the grueling schedule with no complaints, despite a modest stipend of \$3,000 a year. The training was tough, but we persevered. Upon completing our residencies, many of us planned to return home to establish private practices or join medical school faculties. However, martial law imposed by President Marcos on September 21, 1972, shattered those dreams. Stuck in limbo because our J-1 visas required us to return home after training, we were strongly encouraged by our families to stay in the US. Fortunately, on October 27, 1972, President Nixon signed a waiver allowing us to remain if we were married to an American or had children born in the US. Grateful for this opportunity, many of us chose to stay, opening private practices or becoming academicians and clinical researchers.

When FEUDNRSMAF was founded in 1971, Emilie Ongcapin and Danny Fabito played crucial roles in running the organization, with Cora Mendoza serving as Executive Director from 1984-1987. The Annual Reunion and Scientific Convention was established, and the Fabulous Class of '64 has participated every five years since. Emilie and Danny eventually became president and chairman of the organization, followed by Edmundo Relucio and Rick de Leon. Over the years, the Class of '64, under the leadership of Danny and Ed, was instrumental in relocating the FEUNRMF Institute of Medicine and Medical Center to Fairview, Quezon City. Emilie Ongcapin served as dean of the Institute of Medicine from 1987 to 1990, while Danny Fabito held prestigious positions, including President of the Association of Philippine Physicians in America (APPA) and the Society of Philippine Surgeons in America. Other classmates also achieved remarkable success, such as Amelia Cruz, who was elected President of the Maternal and Fetal Medicine Society and served as a Board Examiner for the American Board of Obstetrics and Gynecology; Norma Veridiano, who became a Diplomate of the American Board of OB/GYN, graduated from Fordham University School of Law, and earned a Master's in Health Care Management from Harvard University School of Public Health; Rosalina Liongson Abboud, the first Filipino consultant to join the Mayo Clinic's Department of OB-GYN, was recognized in its OB-GYN commemorative book in 2017 as a pioneer in Urogynecology; and Engracio Cortes, past president of the NY Cancer Society and a Traveling Oncology Consultant at the University of Southern California, gained "15 minutes of fame" when his research on Adriamycin in Osteosarcoma, which raised the cure rate from 20% to 55%, was published in the New England Journal

of Medicine (291:998-1000, 1974). His work on immunotherapy for lung cancer was also funded by the National Cancer Institute.

The 60th reunion of the Class of '64, held on June 27-30, 2024, in Chicago, was more than just a gathering—it was a profound occasion. Twenty of us attended, ten women and ten men, with some needing assistance such as canes or wheelchairs. Cora Mendoza, our artistic director, prepared a chorus line rendition of "*Let Us Entertain You*," followed by the group singing "*You Raise Me Up*," with Billy Pasia's beautiful baritone voice leading the refrain. The three days of rehearsals were memorable, exposing our out-of-tune and rhythm inadequacies, but by the end, we were all synchronized. We may not have been Ethel Merman, Josh Groban, or the Madrigal Singers, but our short performance celebrated our shared past experiences, creating a moment steeped in history, reflection, and deep personal and professional meaning. The reunion also allowed us to celebrate the enduring friendships we have built over the past 60 years.

Sixty years ago, we stood at the threshold of demanding but rewarding careers, filled with the optimism and uncertainty of young doctors just beginning their journeys. Over the ensuing decades, we navigated the rapidly evolving landscape of medicine, witnessing and contributing to transformative changes in healthcare. We saw the introduction of diagnostic ultrasound, CT scans, MRI, PET/CT scans, and, most recently, the liquid biopsy of ctDNA, which has replaced invasive biopsies. We also lived through the resurgence of the Hong Kong flu in 1968, the emergence of the Ebola virus in 1976, HIV/AIDS in 1980, SARS in 2002, swine flu in 2009, Zika virus in 2015, and COVID-19 in 2019, among others.

This 60th reunion serves as a lens through which we view the dramatic evolution of medicine. The advances that have occurred since we graduated and first donned our white coats are nothing short of extraordinary. We not only witnessed these changes but were often at the forefront of implementing them. We have seen the transition from handwritten patient notes to electronic health records, the rise of minimally invasive surgeries, the perfection of heart, lung, and liver transplants, and the explosion of knowledge brought about by the completion of the Human Genome Project in 2003. The development of life-saving drugs and technologies has rendered "one size fits all" therapies obsolete, giving rise to personalized or targeted treatments and the evolution of cancer immunotherapy with the discovery of checkpoint inhibitors. Now, we face a new frontier with artificial intelligence (AI), a groundbreaking advancement comparable to the discovery of the nuclear bomb.

Over the course of 60 years, it is inevitable that some of our classmates have passed away. This reunion serves as a poignant reminder of life's fragility and the importance of cherishing the time we have left. Remembering those who have departed and reflecting on their contributions to medicine and their communities is an integral part of this reunion. This sentiment was beautifully expressed during our chorus presentation when Billy Pasia dedicated our song, *"You Raise Me Up*," to our departed classmates.

Looking to the future, this milestone is also an opportunity to consider the legacy that the Fabulous Class of '64 leaves behind. Almost all of us are retired, but our influence continues through the students we have taught, the colleagues we have mentored, and the patients whose lives we have touched. Under the leadership of Danny Fabito, who spearheaded and supported Class '64, we established the Professional Chair in Surgery, a Scholarship Fund for Economic Hardship, and continued our support of the Postgraduate Surgical Program in the Department of Surgery. Class '64 remains actively involved in the annual scientific CME program.

As the reunion came to an end, the Fabulous Class of '64 left with a renewed sense of connection and purpose. We carry with us the memories of our shared experiences and the knowledge that our contributions to medicine have made a lasting difference. This reunion, while marking the passage of time, is a powerful reminder that the bonds formed in medical school can endure a lifetime, and the impact of our work in medicine will resonate for generations to come.

1974 was a sweet year, marking the end of our long journey through medical school. After years of hard work and countless late-night study sessions, we finally graduated. I have a special place in my heart for the pork and beans and kare-kare that my cousin would cook whenever I craved them. Then came residency, where we survived on unidentifiable yet surprisingly tasty hospital cafeteria food. And who could forget the sardines with a squeeze of calamansi? Those were to die for! Despite our lack of money, we always had good appetites. If memory serves me right, our batch achieved a 100% passing rate, with Guat Sy, MD, as our topnotcher. What a moment that was!

Some of us went on to train at FEU Hospital, while others pursued opportunities in the USA. I spent four years training in the OB-GYN Department at FEU, learning from magnificent attendings and co-residents. Fast forward to life in the USA, where I entered the residency program at Cook County Hospital, followed by three years of clinical fellowship in Ambulatory Obstetrics, Gynecologic Oncology, and Reproductive Endocrinology and Infertility. Those three years felt incredibly long, especially after already completing four years of training at FEU. But looking back, they were crucial, particularly when I faced my oral examination to become a certified diplomate in Obstetrics and Gynecology. These challenges, though hard to understand at the time, turned out to be hidden blessings.

Following my mentor's advice, I stayed on as an attending at Cook County Hospital (now Stroger Hospital of Cook County), serving people from all parts of the world—often straight from O'Hare to the Emergency Room and then to labor and delivery. As a woman, a foreign graduate, and the only Filipina in the department, I had to quickly adapt, even learning idioms on the fly. I remember a patient saying, "*I need to puke*," and me wondering what "*puke*" meant—until it was too late!

One morning, while scrubbing a case, I received a page from Kuya Cesar Reyes, asking me to speak at Navy Pier about women's health. That was my introduction to the Philippine Medical Association in Chicago and the Far Eastern University Medical Alumni Association in Northern Illinois. Thank God for Kuya Cesar! Friendships with other FEU alumni soon followed, and in 2006, Israel and I joined the mission group. Those mission years became significant parts of our lives. Beyond making new friends, we had the opportunity to serve our "*kababayan*" without expecting anything in return—a solemn privilege.

During my time as an attending at Stroger Hospital of Cook County, I was privileged to serve as the site director for residents from Northwestern Hospital and third-year medical students at the Cermak Correctional Center. I also served as the consulting OB-GYN attending for the Department of Justice at Cermak Correctional Service. Working with the 1,000 women at the start of my tenure taught me

valuable life lessons. I saw women share ramen noodle soup with joy and laughter, as if it were the best meal ever. After clinic hours at Cermak, my students and I would give lectures to groups of women in their "*apartments*," each housing up to 38 individuals. Our goal was to prepare these patients for re-entry into the community. I did this for 14 years, and it was deeply rewarding. I remember receiving an email from a former student who was also working at a correctional center, and it made me realize the lasting impact of our work. For that, I am profoundly grateful.

We celebrated our 25th graduation anniversary in Atlantic City, NJ, surrounded by cherished memories, abundant food, and enlightening lectures. Now, in 2024, we are the Golden Jubilarians. The events in the Philippines at FEUNRMF were filled with lectures, dancing, fun, and bonding. Here in Chicago, nine of us from our group reunited, and despite our smaller numbers, the fun and laughter remained undiminished. Stiff joints didn't stop us from putting together a dance. Thank you, my friends—we're all game!

At this stage, we are all categorized as geriatrics, meaning 65 years old and above. Some of our friends are sick, and some have passed away. We remember our schoolmates and the lives we shared, learning from each other through tears and laughter. We lived harmoniously. Some planned to join us in Chicago for the 50th celebration, but due to physical and scheduling limitations, they sent their regards instead. Thankfully, technology has kept us connected and updated on each other's lives through Zoom, Messenger, and Facebook.

In my conversations with fellow FEU graduates, I've noticed a heightened awareness of where we are in life. The thankfulness for being able to come together and celebrate is palpable. That's why I chose to speak about Gratitude. Gratitude is defined as the "feeling of respect or affinity to objects other than self, either animate or inanimate, which are sources of happiness or benefit" (Academia Letters, article 4376). There are three aspects of Gratitude: "gratitude itself," "the results of gratitude," and "the causes of gratitude."

Reflecting on the opening statement, "*Give thanks IN all circumstances*"—whether happy, sad, alone, or with friends—I encourage all of us to embrace this mindset. It's not about giving thanks FOR all circumstances, but IN all circumstances. With all the experiences we've been through, whether painful, joyful, or sorrowful, let us be thankful. A grateful heart is rich in spirit, and that's how we want to stay.

Until we meet again in five years for our Emerald Jubilee, I thank you for allowing me to write this article.
